



What is an Intergovernmental Relations Manager?

- I manage state and federal affairs for Lane County.
- I work in County Administration, but am in constant contact with Commissioners, the District Attorney, Sheriff, and Department Staff.
- We have a Legislative Committee with two appointed Commissioners, and Department Directors.
- I am a registered lobbyist in Oregon and contract with a firm in Washington, DC.
- I have been employed in this position for 12 years.

Why is public health policy advocacy important to me?

- It is important to Lane County, which serves as the Board of Health. The breadth of authority that the Board of Health has is unique among local government.
- Prevention saves significant money and heartache.
 Taxpayers expect effective "upstream" work, and public health has a good story to tell to those who are underwhelmed by "government" writ large.
- Public health employees are highly committed to their work but are not necessarily experts at changing policy. I help them focus their energy to the right audiences at the right time with the right messaging.

- Build relationships
- Share the joy
- Show up

Public Health Policy Advocacy

- Identify the correct audience.
 - Don't waste time with the wrong person
- Identify a local champion and foster that relationship.
 - At your Board of Commissioners and State Delegation
- Establish context.
 - This is import because...(or provide a recent example)
- Be brief in all communications.
 - State what you want in first sentence. Use bullets whenever possible and cite data if available
- Remember to thank your elected officials.
 - Share info and updates regularly, host meetings, and otherwise become a resource
- Build statewide coalitions and avoid unique programs.
 - While cute, "When you've been to one Oregon county you've been to one Oregon county" is not a recipe for effective partnerships
