OHA Communications Strategies for Let's RISE Initiative

- Share data: ALERT IIS and Tableau dashboard can help determine who is behind on routine immunizations. Reminder/Recall?
- **Engage providers as messengers**: Establish provider confidence in the vaccines, empower providers as effective and credible messengers.
- Generate earned media: To raise public interest in routine vaccinations and keep Oregonians informed and engaged.
- Enhance access to adult vaccination services.
- Leverage the influence of social media: Organize influencers to reach hesitant communities, counter misinformation and establish vaccine as a social norm.
- Awareness campaign: Piggyback on events such as Public Health Week and back-to-school.

Did You Know Your Child Can Get Free Vaccines?

Vaccines for Children Can Help

The Vaccines for Children (VFC) program provides free vaccines to children who qualify. About half of American children less than 19 years old receive VFC vaccine.

Is my child eligible for the VFC Program?

Children are eligible if it is before

- their 19th birthday and they:

 Qualify for Medicaid
- · Don't have insurance
- Are American Indian or Alaska Native

Children whose insurance doesn't cover some or all routinely recommended vaccines (underinsured) can still get vaccines through VFC if they go to a Federally Qualified Health Center or Rural Health Clinic.

Where can I go to get my child vaccinated?

- Ask if your child's doctor or nurse is a VFC provider. Nationally, there are thousands of health care providers enrolled in the VFC program.
- If your child does not have a doctor, ask if your local public health department provides vaccines.
- Visit a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) or Rural Health Clinic (RHC).

- How much will I have to pay?

 All routinely recommended vaccines
- are free through the VFC Program.
- Doctors can charge fees to give each shot. However, they cannot refuse to vaccinate your child if you are
- unable to pay these fees.
- The doctor can charge additional fees for the office visit or nonvaccine services such as an eye exam or blood test.

Where can I get more information?

- · Ask your child's doctor's office if
- they participate in VFC.
- If you don't have a regular doctor's office:
- See if your state has a searchable website for VFC providers.
- Call your state or local
- health department.


