	 Subdivision fund: 55% (\$183 million) goes directly to cities and counties in the same payment schedule as the State Fund. All decisions are made locally. Non-litigating Oregon towns, cities, and counties with a population less than 10,000 are not eligible to receive an allocation of OR Subdivision Funds.
