

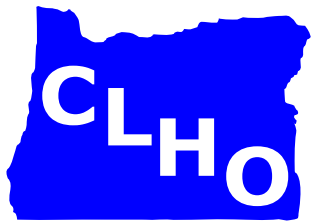

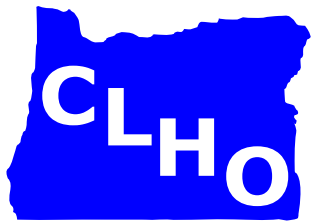

<p>PE 62 Overdose Prevention Revised</p>		<p>OHA is working with CLHO to update <i>PE 62: Overdose Prevention</i> to include the following language, as an allowable (not required) activity for LPHAs: <i>Coordinate with the stakeholders responsible for determining how local governments will allocate opioid settlement funds within the county and/or region to implement complementary overdose prevention activities. Support coordination of local resource allocation.</i> CLHO is reviewing PE 62 now, with the goal of implementing this updated language at the beginning of the new Regional Overdose Prevention Coordinator project period on 9/1/22.</p> <div data-bbox="557 741 613 804" data-label="Image"> </div> <p>PE62 Overdose Prevention_Revised</p>	<p>Laura Chisholm</p>
<p>HB 4098</p>		<p>Opioid settlement funds and HB 4098: The Oregon Attorney General litigated multiple settlements on behalf of Oregon with opioid manufacturers and distributors, bringing approximately \$333 million to Oregon in 18 payments through 2038. This number is expected to increase, as other litigation is still pending. The funding must be allocated to prevention, treatment and recovery strategies outlined in the settlement. More information: National opioid settlement: https://nationalopioidsettlement.com/</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ State of Oregon Opioid Settlement Prevention, Treatment & Recovery Fund: 45% goes to the State (\$150 million), created in 2022 with HB 4098. Allocation decisions will be made by an 18-person Board, for <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Statewide and regional prevention, treatment and recovery strategies outlined in the national settlement and in alignment with the Alcohol and Drug Policy Commission statewide strategic plan ▪ Development of a data system to track availability & efficacy of substance use prevention, treatment and recovery services in Oregon ▪ Fund administration (capped at 5%) ▪ The Advisory Board information will be posted on the Board and Commission Member Opportunities page: https://oregon.wd5.myworkdayjobs.com/Boards 	<p>Lisa Shields and Laura Chisholm</p>



		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Subdivision fund: 55% (\$183 million) goes directly to cities and counties in the same payment schedule as the State Fund. All decisions are made locally. Non-litigating Oregon towns, cities, and counties with a population less than 10,000 are not eligible to receive an allocation of OR Subdivision Funds. Please see Exhibit A, pages 9-11 of the Oregon Subdivision Agreement for allocation percentages to participating cities and counties: https://nationalopioidsettlement.com/wp-content/uploads/2022/01/FINAL-Dec-20-Oregon-Intra-State-Allocation.pdf ○ Tribal settlements: Approximately \$503 million is going directly to Tribes and tribal health organizations from Janssen & Distributor Settlements. All federally recognized Tribes are eligible to participate in the Tribal Opioid Settlements, regardless of whether a Tribe filed an opioid lawsuit.
