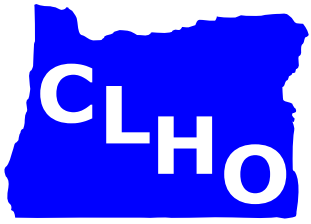
IVPP	Follow-up	<p>Courtney provided an update on the fentanyl media campaign. There is \$140,000 to distribute to LPHAs to support local media campaigns on fentanyl and counterfeit pills. Courtney is seeking CLHO's input on how to distribute the funds and how to determine which counties are eligible to participate in the funding. She summarized the two options previously discussed. There are advantages and disadvantages with both options. A big advantage of option one (funding through PE 62) is the speed of distributing the funding to the counties. Hiring a contractor (option two) would take much more time to get the funding released from OHA. Lane and Klamath counties have campaigns in place and are willing to share them.</p> <p>An ad-hoc committee came up with option 3. The third option would allow OHA to provide funding to LPHAs with PE 62, who could then subcontract with other counties to distribute the funding. This would allow PE 62 and non-PE 62 counties to receive funding.</p> <p>Katie Plumb supported getting the funding mechanism off the ground rapidly with bandwidth and capacity reaching counties with the most need. She recommended tapping into Klamath County which has completed their campaign and Lane County which is almost done. Lindsey Manfrin suggested using shared demographics to spend dollars with non-PE 62 counties based on drug use and prevention needs.</p> <p>Courtney thanked the ad-hoc committee for their work. The ad-hoc committee is meeting again soon to finalize decisions. Courtney will present a proposal at the November meeting for a vote.</p> <p> Fentanyl Media Campaign Funding.</p>	Courtney Fultineer

		<p>amendments but there is a backlog in the process due to limited fiscal staff capacity. The best-case scenario is that it will be December or January before the money is dispersed to the counties and CBO's.</p> <p>Jennifer expressed concerns that there is a tight deadline and no guarantee that the money can be spent during the parameters of the funding. Sara Hartstein voiced concerns that there is a lot of money to get out of the door and requested that PHD consider giving programs an additional 6 months to use the funds. Stephen agreed to ask if an extension is possible.</p>	
PE 36 Update	Discussion	<p>The review of modernization and best practice prevention in alcohol and other drug prevention and education program (ADPEP) in PE 36 was reviewed by Jill Quackenbush and Belinda Ballah and others. Changes included language around primary prevention, definitions, national academies of science and Certified Prevention Specialist requirements. They were hopeful the changes would be approved at the meeting. Belinda said the goal was to have alcohol and other drugs program element definition align with newer definitions and modernization.</p> <p>Jamie asked if the process and requirements would create a barrier to certification and would there be resources provided to attain the designation/certification?</p> <p>The certified prevention specialist (CPS) was found to provide best practices with OHA providing the training pathway previously and requiring it under OARs. Katie said there was only a part-time position in many counties. Gwyn said the certification process was under the supervision of the staff CPS. Lindsey remembered that the certification was a requirement previously but that it had been removed from the PE. Several members said that there needs to be a deeper dive to explore historically why the certification had been removed. Sara Hartstein</p>	Belinda Ballah & Jill Quackenbush



		<p>questioned why it was being added back into PE 36. The time and intensity including maintaining the certification was thought to have interfered with getting the regular work done. Could we say “encouraged to have” the certification?</p> <p>Jennifer encouraged staff to explore the historical background about why the certification was not required for ADPEP. We will discuss this at the November meeting. Belinda said a study from OHSU determined that there are 900 CPS needed in the state and currently there are 62. Comprehensive Suicide Prevention Guide	Next steps & LPHA Representatives	<p>Laura Chisholm and Deb Darmata shared an update on the awarded Expansion of Comprehensive Suicide Prevention Across the U.S. grant. The CLHO HPP subcommittee had submitted a letter of support for the grant in June. It is a five-year grant, and the first-year award is \$855,000. The grant is focused on development of public health suicide prevention capacity at the state level. Initiatives must correspond with the CDC’s Technical Package on Suicide Prevention and must focus on disproportionately affected populations. Deb reviewed the draft project logic model, which outlines the proposed populations of focus (older adults, those living in rural and remote areas, veterans, and people with access to firearms).</p> <p>The next steps include soliciting partner feedback and establishing an advisory board.
