nce of Local Health Officials  IVPP	Review	Local Fentanyl Media Campaigns	Courtney
		Courtney Fultineer (IVPP) said there are different	Fultineer
		options to provide funding to support local fentanyl	
		media campaigns. LPHA's will determine how to	
		proceed in the counties to receive funding. The need	
		and demand are great. There is currently \$80k	
		allocated to support local LPHA's campaigns in the	
		development of their campaigns with the potential for	
		an additional \$100K and total of \$180k. The timeline	
		to spend funds is August 2023. OHA is trying to decide	
		best way to fund LPHA's. The two options include:	
		Working with 11 counties to distribute funding through PE 62.	
		Working with a contractor to disperse RFP	
		funding to all counties that wish to participate.	
		The first choice would be quicker and easier to get the	
		funds out of the door. It would go to the 11 LPHA's	
		that have PE 62. Option 2 would take time to go	
		through the contracting and RFP process and the	
		timeline would be pushed to January 2023 before funding would be dispersed to the counties.	
		Approximately 20-30% of funds would go to the	
		contractor to develop the campaign. More counties	
		could be involved with Option 2.	
		Hannah Roy (Malheur) is not in program element 62.	
		Counties with high overdose rates are also in rural	
		areas. There has been a massive overdose rate spike in	
		the past 6 months. Supporting evidence for option 1	
		would be unfair since there are so few counties in PE	
		62. Elisabeth suggested that the overdose data be	
		reviewed with the dollars to be dispersed based on	
		need. Tanya said a contractor can create the campaign	
		and it could be shared throughout the state. Jennifer	
		indicated an RFP could be solicited from counties that	
		wish to participate. Sara shared that Lane, Douglas, and Klamath are debuting campaigns this fall and that	
		campaigns could be disseminated statewide.

		Feedback to Courtney suggested that a more realistic	
		timeline would be appropriate. The formation of an ad	
		hoc committee could meet that would be like the BM	



108 meetings this summer to determine funding mechanisms. Counties that wish to participate in the ad hoc meeting should put their names in the chat. 		Guidance for direct cessation services was prepared	Weston
		for LPHA's to use for cessation services. After sharing	
		BM 108 guidance, OHA received questions from TPEP	
		coordinators about guidance and resources. A	
		document was created and shared with counties that	
		expressed interest but wasn't shared with everyone.	
		OHA apologized that the guidance was only shared	
		with folks who expressed interest and not everyone.	
		If there are additional criteria for eligible activities,	
		please reach out to OHA Liaisons. This document is included below.	
		A question was asked about a mechanism to purchase	
		NRT in quantities? Is there a more efficient way to purchase NRT? It is wildly inefficient if siloed counties	
		are trying to purchase these products. OHA will discuss	
		potential pharmacy partners with their team and	
		share with the committee. Cardinal Health might be a	
		good partner and Costco has provided excellent prices	
		on bulk quantities in the past.	
		Culturally appropriate guidelines don't fall under best	
		practices just yet. Practice Based evidence or	
		Promising Practice is currently in place. Eligible	
		activities are flexible as the goal is to be as	
		community-driven as possible.	
		Jamie Zentner requested confirmation that if LPHA's	
		want to purchase NRTs they would need OHA approval	
		for the purchase in addition to providing counseling.	
		OHA verified that anything being done locally would	
		need to be shared with the State to assure continue

		The BM 108 discussion is a continuation of what Emily	Maxwell
		just presented. Jennifer asked what NRTs might look in	
		individual counties. How do we get the best price?	
		Initial searches reflect that the NRT cost is expensive,	
		even more than cigarettes.	
		Questions that arose during the meeting include:	
		<ul><li>What does liability look like?</li></ul>	
		Do health officers need to be involved? Who	
		can distribute this?	
		<ul> <li>Is there a standing order necessary for this?</li> </ul>	
		<ul> <li>Could we proceed with processes like condom distribution?</li> </ul>	
		What about outreach events or providing to	
		cessation groups 18+ and above?	
		cessation groups 10 varia above.	
		The committee discussed how everyone is going to	
		approach this. In Lane County, a methadone clinic is in	
		development for the workplace to include cessation	
		counseling and services. These have been expanded by	
		providing NRT as benefit. Cardinal Health is used for	
		medical supplies. Mobile units providing NRTs in rural	
		communities is desirable. Washington County does	
		not have county operated clinics. They have not	
		planned on distributing NRT at this time. Most MAT	
		clinics require you to be in SUD outpatient for the	
		same reason because counseling works better	
		together.	
		Clackamas does not have plans to distribute NRT. NRT	
		is much cheaper at Costco as opposed to Amazon.	
		Pairing NRT with cessation therapy counseling is	
		important. There is so much involved beyond NRT with	
		quitting and there are concerns with pushing NRTs out	
		without thoughtful pairing with counseling.	
		Benton County will not be distributing NRT but hope	
		to provide funds to The Arc of Benton County for NRT,	
		stemming items, and other supports for cessation. In	
		addition to training, the county is seeking successful	
		cessation programs for IDD community members.
